CHARACTERS OF THE XI.

T. STRATHAIRN (Captain)—has scarcely fulfilled the expectations of last year. Has, however, many good strokes—being especially strong on the off, and has perhaps been unfortunate in not having compiled larger totals. Somewhat careless in the field at times, but successful as a wicket-keeper.

J. D. CURRIE—a useful rather than an elegant bat, and is to be congratulated on obtaining the highest average. Has scored consistently throughout the season. Can field well when he makes the effort.

T. WOOD—has shared the attack with Morris with considerable success, but occasionally inclined to pitch his balls too short. With the bat scored freely at the commencement of the season, but has fallen off of late. Good field.

J. MORRIS—a good medium-fast bowler, but apt to be erratic. As a batsman has met with some success. Capital field.

B. NAPIER—as a batsman is both steady and useful—possessing a capital “out.” Keen in the field but uncertain, though has improved wonderfully.

F. BLATHERWICK—has perhaps the best style in the eleven, though is invariably beaten by a yorker, his forward stroke being especially noticeable. Slow in the field.

C. W. CASSILS—a useful bat hitting hard all round the wickets and scoring rapidly. Smart in the field and fair change bowler.

H. SHAND—a good slow bowler—keeping a nice length. Fair bat, but very poor field.

J. STRANG—a really reliable bat—improved uniformly as the season progressed. Has been known to bowl. Good field and can take the “gloves.”

CAMERON—steady bat and seldom easily disposed of. Keeps wicket with success.

F. THOMSON—fair change bowler, using considerable judgment. Good field but indifferent bat.

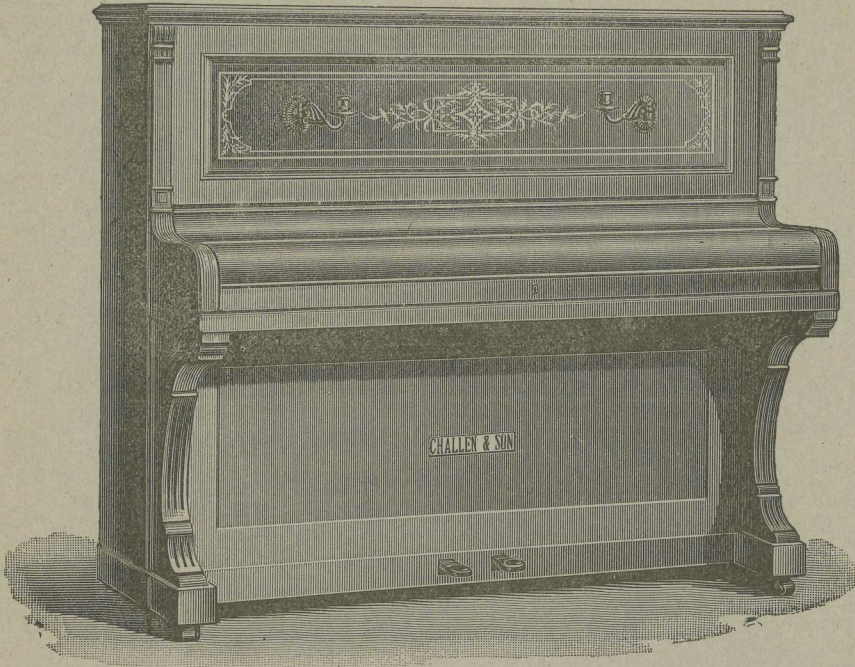
OUR EXAMINATION.

Professor Strong, University College, Liverpool, and Professor Steggall, University College, Dundee, examined Morrison's Academy on the 15th, 16th, and 17th, of July. At the conclusion of the examination, Professor Strong addressed the boys. He

had, he said, to thank the Rector for the opportunity afforded him of seeing all the boys together. He had to congratulate them on the results of their examination—they had really made an excellent appearance. He also congratulated them on their healthy, happy looks. But he would like to speak of one evil, which this school had in common with other schools—he referred to the tendency to leave school at too early an age. When boys left school at an age of fifteen or even sixteen, they left it at a time when they were most able to profit by the best thoughts of their masters. They should remember that they were under men who devoted the best part of their lives to fitting them for the battle of life. He considered that they were in the best type of British school—he made no distinction between England and Scotland. A public school boy's life at school meant much more to them than to a boy educated abroad, or by private tutors. By associating with each other, by learning to respect each other, and by demanding respect for themselves, they gained an indefinable something which he would venture to call independence. The period when a boy left school was the most serious in his whole life. He had known many boys break down just at that period, and he attributed that not to hard study, but to the uncertainty as to their future. He would advise them to make up their minds what the course of their study was to be, and to go for it. Whatever they did, whether they emigrated—as he hoped many of them would—to South Africa or Rhodesia, or any other colony, or whether they spent their lives in a counting-house, or in a profession, he hoped that through it all they would bear a happy demeanour and look on the bright side of things. He had to thank the Rector and the staff for their courtesy, and to wish everybody a happy holiday.
